## REMARKS

Upon unanimous consent request of Representative Watson, Minister Rogers' remarks were printed in full as follows:

“I want to express my thanks to Representative Watson and you the House members for the opportunity to be the House Chaplain this week. I count it an honor to have been here with you.

Statisticians tell us that more and more people are thinking less and less of the Bible as an authority for faith and life. With that in mind, is it any wonder that as a nation we are in

the shape we're in spiritually, morally and socially? I can't help but ask, what has brought us to this point, where the Word of God once held in high esteem, has become now nothing more than a history book at best and a collection of folk stories and fables at worst. Sad, but true, for even many Christians it's nothing more than a religious accessory. I'm sure there are many reasons that could be cited for this disregard for the Word of God. I'm convinced that the increased indoctrination of humanism, the lack of emphasis on and adherence to the authority of God's word within the American home and the failure of the Church to emphasize the relevance of God's Word to life have contributed to this problem. Up until recently the Bible was considered by most to be verbally inspired by God and to be the revelation of God to man, the infallible, authoritative rule for faith and life. However, it appears that's no longer the case. Yet, the truth still remains we are all influenced and guided by something. The psalmist, David, chose to be influenced and guided by God's Word. He wrote, 'Your word is a lamp to my feet and a light for my path.' The symbolism is obvious; God's Word is like a torch to a man in a dark night. It shows him the way. It prevents him from stumbling. It safeguards him from precipices along the way. It keeps him from wandering off the right path. If we will make God's Word a lamp unto our feet and a light unto our path, we will see and be able to better address the divergences among us and we will better discern the obstructions and pitfalls which lie in our way. God's Word will give us both specific and general guidance for faith and life.

Life is too full of perils for us to trust our own insight and ability to navigate through it. Yet, in light of and under the authority of God's Word, we can safely and securely pass through this life. Let us as leaders always remember that God's Word is relevant at all times, to all men.

May God's favor be upon you today!"
