

House District 4 | Rep. Bob Ed Culver

HD 4 had **37,367** people when it was redistricted in 2011. The target population at that time was **37,142** people per House District.

Now it has an estimated **38,654** people, according to the latest numbers from the American Community Survey, a program of the U.S. Census Bureau.

The current estimate is **-285** away from the estimated district target of **38,939** people, which is determined by dividing our estimated statewide population (3,932,870) by the 101 House Districts.

The district's population has changed an estimated **3.44%** between 2010 and now.

- 61% of the district is White, alone or in combination with one or more other races.
- 2.8% of the district is Black or African American, alone or in combination with one or more other races.
- 43.8% of the district is American Indian and Alaskan Native, alone or in combination with one or more other races.
- 1.3% of the district is Asian, alone or in combination with one or more other races.
- 0.3% of the district is Native Hawaiian and Other Pacific Islander, alone or in combination with one or more other races.
- 2.2% of the district is some other race.
- 7.5% of the district is of Hispanic or Latino origin.

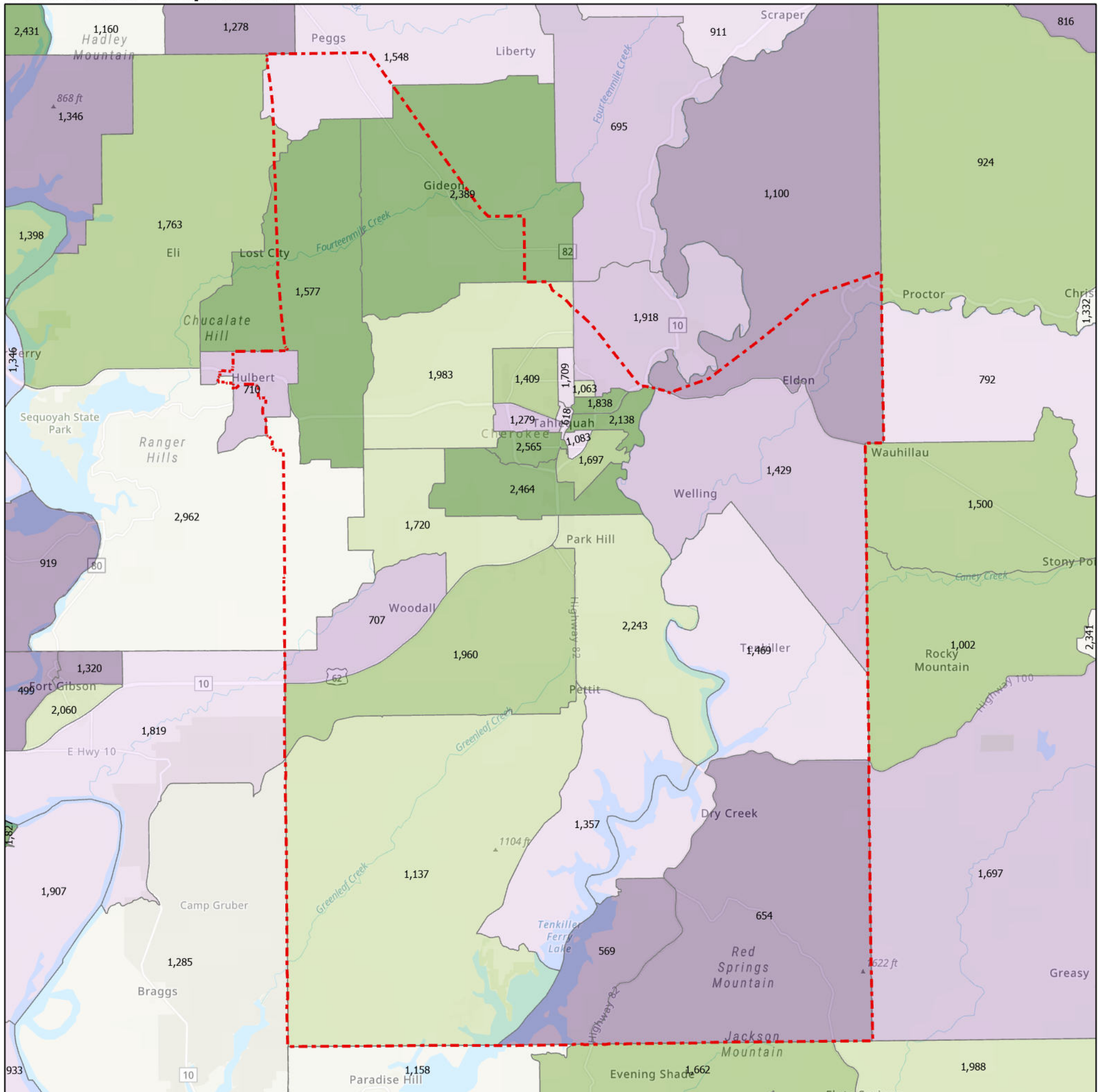
